### About the Session:

The Learning Lab will be focusing on the following messages:

- Gender-responsive DRR is underlined in the Sendai Framework for Disaster Risk Reduction as a necessary condition for effective DRR outcomes for community resilience building.
- Similarly, other global frameworks emphasize on gender-responsive climate actions as a non-negotiable requirement.
- Governments in Asia and the Pacific region have committed to gender-responsive implementation through the National DRR strategies, and Nationally Determined Contributions (NDCs).
- An assessment of the status after 7 years of the Sendai Framework confirms that the awareness and capacities of National Disaster Management Organizations (NDMOs) need to be enhanced further to mainstream gender aspects in Disaster Risk Reduction (DRR) programmes.
- Similarly, focal organizations for climate change are challenged by gaps in gender data, information, and coordinated efforts.
- More importantly, coordinated actions of a range of key stakeholder institutions are required to ensure the integration of gender considerations across DRR and climate action planning and implementation processes.
